MARCH'S SPEAKER

The March speaker is William Groneman III. Mr. Groneman sent shock waves through the Texas historical and antiquarian document communities in 1994 when he dared to suggest that an iconographic Mexican "diary" of the Texas revolution was a modern day fake. His session at the 1995 Texas State Historical Association meeting in San Antonio, where he presented a paper on the subject and on his book *Defense of a Legend*, drew the largest crowd in the association's one hundred year history. The controversy continues to this day. He is author of: *Roll Call at the Alamo*, *Alamo Defenders*, *Defense of a Legend*, *Eyewitness to the Alamo*, *Battlefields of Texas*, *Death of a Legend*, *September 11, 2001*, *David Crockett*, and *All Hands*. He achieved his goal of entering the New York City Fire Department in 1977, after working for three years as a Uniformed Court Officer in New York City Criminal Court. Bill served the FDNY and the City for the next twenty-five years in the ranks of Firefighter, Fire Marshal, Lieutenant, and Captain. He retired from the fire service in 2002 to continue his writing career. A full report of his presentation will be in the April newsletter

The Daughters of the Republic of Texas has staged its Pilgrimage to the Alamo since 1925. The pilgrimage is a memorial tribute to the Alamo heroes and the heritage of Texas. A solemn, wreath-bearing procession of historic, civic, patriotic, military and school groups walks silently to the Alamo. At the same time, an announcer intones the names of the Alamo defenders from within the Alamo walls. The ceremony concludes with a brief memorial service.

The 89th annual Patriotic and Historical Ball is one of the galas opening the 2008 Fiesta activities. The event, recalling early Texas with the performance of traditional pioneer dances, leads off with everyone participating in the Grand March. The first Patriotic and Historical Ball took place in 1919 to honor San Antonio's military personnel, and the event has continued since that time. 117TH SAR CONGRESS • WILLIAMSBURG, VIRGINIA • JULY 6-12, 2007

The San Antonio chapter was represented at the 117th Congress by Chancellor General Ed Butler and his wife, Robin, who was the outgoing First Vice President of the National SAR Ladies Auxiliary, and by Rev. James Taylor and his wife, Pat.

On July 6th while Ed Butler was meeting with the NSSAR Executive Committee, Rev. Taylor was a participant in the all day SAR Genealogy Seminar. Judge Butler started the annual seminar as Genealogist General, the previous two years. That evening 300 of the 621 attendees had a festive colonial dinner at the historic James Shields Tavern. Food was served family style, and nobody went away hungry. Fiddlers and entertainers in period costume kept us laughing.

On Saturday, July 7th seven busloads of SAR members and their wives toured the Yorktown Battlefield, where the British were finally defeated in the American Revolutionary War. The group also visited the Yorktown visitor's center and museum. Box lunches were served aboard the bus. That evening over 600 attended the Virginia host society's welcome reception. The food was delicious.

On Sunday morning, many SAR committees met. That afternoon, over 100 uniformed color guardsmen marched to the annual SAR Memorial Service at Williamsburg Methodist Church. Our former chapter member Al Jamison, was one of the newly departed to be honored at this beautiful service. Robin and Pat attended the First Lady's (Wanda White) Reception afterwards. We ate dinner in private groups that evening before the Rumbaugh Orations final contest. Ed Butler met with the SAR Foundation Board until midnight.

On Monday morning the opening session of the Congress was started with the huge color guard posting the colors to the beat of a drum and fife. Ed sat at the head table next to Linda Gist Calvin, newly elected President General of the DAR. At that meeting Ed gave his report as Chancellor General. That evening was Awards Night, and although the Texas Society won several awards, it did not fare as well as in previous years. The Georgia SAR Society won more than its share of awards. Ed, as a Minuteman, participated in the Minuteman Awards ceremonies.

The second session of congress started on Tuesday morning, the highlight of which was the report of the nominating committee. Ed and Jim both attended the George Washington Fellow's luncheon, and Rev. Taylor, by pledging a \$1,000.00 donation, became a new George Washington Fellow. Robin and Ed had a free afternoon, and spent it by the hotel pool, eating an early dinner there. Texas had 27 members registered, and many brought their wives. All posed for a group photo before the banquet that night. Men were in white dinner jackets or period dress. Many of the Texas ladies were period dresses. This banquet honored the outgoing officers, including Ed Butler, the outgoing Chancellor General. All of the General Officers were introduced and paraded to the head table from the rear of the room. The SAR America's Freedom Award was presented to the History Channel, and a Bronze Good Citizenship Medal was presented to the Director of Programming, Charley Mayday. The Keynote speech was by the former Governor of Virginia. Greeting were read from U.S. President, George W. Bush.

The highlight of the final session of the 117th Congress was the election of new General Officers. All General Officers, by virtue of their office, are automatically Trustees of the society. Those elected were as follows:

At 11:00 a.m. seven bus loads of SAR members and their families left on a five hour tour of Jamestowne, including the Jamestowne Visitors Center and Jamestowne Island. It was a great historical tour, but the amount of walking almost did Ed in.

That evening all the new General Officers were dressed in white tie and tails and the ladies had on beautiful cocktail dresses. Again, all the new officers were announced and paraded from the rear of the room to the head table. Outgoing Chancellor General Butler swore in the new general officers, except for the new president general, who was sworn in by the new Chancellor General, Judge Peter Keltch. Our Ed Butler was then sworn in as Treasurer General. by Judge Keltch, who mentioned that he and Judge Butler were sworn in at the same time as Federal Administrative Law Judges, and that they had been classmates at the National Judicial College – 16 years ago. The feature speaker was Dr. Richard Kelso, the chief archeologist at Jamestowne, who gave a wonderful power point demonstration. The Congress was officially adjourned that evening.

Ed had to stay for a three hour executive committee meeting the following morning. Ed recommended that Rev. James Taylor be placed as a member of both the NSSAR Genealogy Committee and the NSSAR Chaplain's Committee. Ed and Robin had rented a car after flying into Norfolk, VA. Jim and Pat drove and visited some historic sites on the way up, and worked in a little genealogy.

At the Congress, over \$40,000.00 was raised for the Center For Advancing American Heritage. The land is paid for and we have about \$3,000,000 in contributions to build the new center, which will house a new library across the street from headquarters in Louisville. It will take about another \$3,000,000 to endow the center's maintenance and upkeep in perpetuity. All members are encouraged to give as much as they can afford for the important project, which will allow us to reach school children all over the United States.

William Chacon Salinas • Born: Feb. 14, 1921 • Died: March 9, 2008

Survived by: Wife Diana R. Salinas; daughters Aurora Martinez and Julie Salinas Toscano; stepsons Armando and Gerald Salinas, Rock Anthony Harrison; sisters Angela Salinas Fernandez and Carmen Salinas Maldonado; eight grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.

Burial at Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery. By fighting in World War II, William Chacon Salinas preserved his family's rich history of honor and devotion to America. Today, as he's laid to rest at Fort Sam Houston, friends and relatives will remember him as a kind, humble man who loved ballroom dancing and almost always wore a tie, his sister said.

Salinas, 87, died Sunday at a local rehabilitation facility from apparent heart failure.

Born in Houston on Valentine's Day, Salinas lived nearly all his life in San Antonio. He joined the Army and was an Air Corps gunner on flights over the Pacific, including the Philippines, Okinawa and Iwo Jima. Many of his letters reached home full of passages that had been inked out by war censors.

That frustrated his younger sister, Angela Salinas Fernandez. She wrote to him, asking him to keep writing letters "just to say he's all right."

He came home from the war a bit different from the caring, attentive brother Fernandez had known. He had malaria, and one day threw down a Spam sandwich she had made, tired of eating processed meat in the Army. Having killed for his country, he felt bitterness for a while toward the Japanese.

In 1947, like his father, a World War I veteran who was an aircraft painter, Salinas got a job painting planes at Kelly Field. He worked there until his first wife died of cancer in 1972.

His ancestors included José de Urrutia, a Spaniard and leading expert on American Indians who was a captain at the San Antonio de Bexar Presidio in the 1730s, and Pablo Salinas, who served at the 1835 Siege of Bexar, the first major campaign in the Texas Revolution. William Salinas, also a descendant of Francisco Manuel Salinas, who helped supply horses and mules to colonists in the American Revolutionary War, belonged to the Sons of the American Revolution.

There were few regrets for the man known as "Willie," or "Popo," as his grandkids called him. He'd often brought friends home to share his family's homemade sweets as a boy, and remained as sweet-tempered with his son Richard Salinas, who served in Vietnam and died in 2004, and his daughter Aurora -- his "little princess." As his health worsened, he stayed close to his sister and her husband, Tito M. Fernandez.

He felt he'd carried on the Salinas tradition of honor, and was glad to have survived the war. "He'd say he was lucky the pilot never got killed, or he would've died," his sister said.
